WHEREAS, on Memorial Day, and every day, we thank them for their sacrifice and acknowledge our eternal debt to them, and through their deeds, we have learned to appreciate the freedoms that are the legacy of their sacrifice; and

WHEREAS, a new generation of men and women in uniform have faced, and continue to face, their own "great task remaining before us," throughout the world. The proud contingent who today wears America's uniform is tied to all other veterans by the same ethic of service in the name of freedom; and

WHEREAS, today we gather to demonstrate our unity, remember our losses, and ask that all citizens of the Commonwealth recognize our unwavering commitment to a future filled with opportunity, justice, and hope for all people.
